#### PROPOSED TOUTOUWAI RELEASE

#### Return of the North Island Robin

It is proposed that Toutouwai (North Island Robin) will be released into the Port Charles Rat Attack area on either the 8th or 9th April this year.

The release is the next phase of the Rat Attack Project; the translocation of Toutouwai is a joint initiative with MEG and DoC Hauraki, with a second release site within the DoC rat control area at Stony Bay.

While a draft translocation proposal is yet to be signed off much of the logistics for the release are being put into place.

Lettecia Williams (MEG) together with Steve Bolton and Rob Chappell (D0C Coromandel) visited Pureora as part of a scoping exercise.

A research team from Waikato University are planning to undertake work on Sound Anchoring. The simultaneous release at two very similar sites is ideal for such work.

The project is dependent on enough birds being captured. Thirty birds into each site. Weather could affect catching. Birds will undergo disease screening as part of the translocation.

Teams of MEG volunteers and DoC staff are being assembled to assist with the training of birds with meal worms, the capture and the monitoring.

We require up to 14 volunteers to assist with the monitoring, as part of the sound anchoring research, for 20 days immediately after release at both sites.

Ongoing monitoring will continue after that initial intense period that will lead onto the identification of nest sites and fledgling rates in the breeding season.

Volunteers are encouraged to be part of this exciting project. Some accommodation will be available.

An official release will be arranged for the Stony Bay site. Look out for further detail on the web site.

Once again volunteers are sought to assist with the catering and the official function. It is an opportunity for volunteers to be involved at many levels.

Well done to the Port Charles Rat Attack Team in ensuring the project has been a success to date. Returning Toutouwai to Moehau is a culmination of the huge effort gone into the Rat Attack project to date.


## WAIKAWAU BAY WETLANDS AND ESTUARY RESEARCH.

Since our last issue of the "MEGaphone" the Waikawau Bay wetlands and estuary has seen: - the eradication of the salt marsh mosquito completed; the White Heron moving on; and the nasty weed - saltwater paspalum - moving inexorably further and further into the open flats of the estuary and along the river banks. There has been an intensification of rodent control, cat and mustelid trapping, and an explosion in the Fernbird population. We've also managed to plant about 500 shrubs and wetland plants to begin enhancement work and provide some windbreak shelter for wildlife and stock. This is thanks to the many volunteers and the Honda Tree Fund for providing the trees.

In other words, just a "tad" busy!!

The World Wildlife Habitat Protection funding is now complemented with funding from Environment Waikato, and allows a small group of us to carry out baseline surveys of the flora and fauna of both the wetlands and the estuary- an area of about 65ha. We've also been helped by groups of overseas volunteers with the monitoring work required, to get some sort of handle on what is there and begin to assess the impact if any of this salt water paspalum.

We're hoping to understand a little of the dynamics of the estuary and wetlands system and the life that exists in it. Everything from shellfish counts to insect surveys; bird species identification and plants; to trapping fish species, both freshwater and saltwater dwellers, to mapping mud, sand, and silted areas. Some of the lands behind the estuary are retired from farming and silt movements during floods are reduced. However, this weed traps silt moving downstream and raises the floor of the estuary. Not only do land plants then begin to colonise, but the pasturelands behind the



estuary are more prone to flooding and salt water invasion, as water is not able to escape so easily out through estuary and river mouth channels. Results of surveys so far suggest that there are very healthy numbers of bird and fish species present and the cockle beds have as many as 500-750 per sq metre! We're also blessed with a reasonable number of the rarer birds such as: Pateke (Brown Teal), Fernbirds, NZ Dotterels, Banded Rails, and Bitterns. Measurements are also beginning to show that the weed is colonizing at an alarming rate. Now we just have to try to understand how serious the impact of this weed problem is. Watch this space!
