The art of catching critters

Want to target pests on your place, but not too sure where to begin? We pass on a few tricks of the trade...

Be clear about your goals

What pests you target will depend on the outcomes you are wanting to achieve. Are you wanting more birdlife, or simply to protect your lemon tree from possums?

Think seasonal

Consider a pest blitz in early spring. Anything done to protect birds during their breeding season is good, even if the pests rebound later.

Mix it up

An individual pest can learn to avoid a trap and pass their cautious genes to their offspring. Using a variety of traps and bait is recommended. Find the tools which suit vou best.

Persevere! Just like house-work, pest control needs to be ongoing. Once you start, don't stop! And have patience. It can take years for a trap to catch its first stoat.

Team up

It helps to see you are part of a bigger picture. Talk to your neighbours or local conservation group about what you are doing. They may be keen to work together or share their knowledge.

Taking stock of what matters

Terry Whitehouse is a master trap-builder and a local legend around these parts. In the past three years he has built over 800 stoat traps for us, all in his own time.

Terry has been involved in MEG since the early days. Health problems prevented him getting out into the field, so he stuck his hand up for the task of trap-building. Over the past three years, he's worked like a trooper to upgrade all of our old stoat traps that were installed in 2005. Years of practice has helped him refine the process, and he can now knock up a trap in a matter of minutes. We'd be lost without him!

This term, Terry had a little help from the Year 5/6 class at Coromandel Area School. The kids have built 29 stoat traps for us, and painted positive messages on the boxes to help raise awareness about kiwi. The traps will replace old, rusty traps in our Coromandel Kiwi Project. Now we're nearing the end of our trap upgrade, we hope Terry can enjoy a well-deserved break, and reflect on a job well done.

It was purchased from money we have fundraised, and is a big investment for MEG, but one we felt was necessary to ensure the safety of our team.

THE BEST TIME TO HEAR KIWI

Shorter days and colder nights means it's time to count kiwi calls. This year we aim to survey 13 sites, with each site visited five times. The best time to hear kiwi is on dusk, when they emerge from their burrows or shelters. We listen from May-July to get a handle on kiwi numbers, before breeding pairs hunker down for egg-laying. Kiwi pairs with often duet, one calling immediately after their partner has finished. Juvenile kiwi don't call. If you'd like to come on a listen, call Lettecia on 078666626.
